



## OUR STEWARDSHIP STORY

For over 30 years, North American manufacturers of particleboard and medium density fiberboard (MDF) have been at the forefront of developing standards for formaldehyde emissions and have actively supported national regulations widely recognized as the most stringent in the world today.

- Worked closely with the California Air Resources Board (CARB) to support development and implementation of California's formaldehyde emissions regulation.
- Voluntarily applied the California emissions limits to all U.S. production.
- Led efforts along with the Sierra Club and other NGOs to secure bipartisan legislation calling for a national formaldehyde emissions regulation.
- Actively supported EPA's development of TSCA Title VI implementing regulations based on the California standard.
- Developed world's leading sustainability certification standard, Eco-Certified Composite (ECC), which requires 100% compliance with EPA formaldehyde emission levels for 100% of production.



The newly implemented federal formaldehyde regulation, known as TSCA Title VI includes:

- Rigorous third-party certification and testing by EPAapproved certifiers and testing labs.
- Quarterly audits and lot-by-lot testing with results reported to the third-party certifier.
- Testing of collected samples to be done at an EPAapproved laboratory.
- Non-complying lots to be isolated and properly managed.
- Composite panel producers, finished product manufacturers, distributors and retailers to meet recordkeeping and labeling requirements to ensure chain-of-custody and proper notice.

NO OTHER REGULATORY REGIME IN THE WORLD TODAY FOR COMPOSITE WOOD PANELS CARRIES THIS LEVEL OF OVERSIGHT to ensure each production lot destined for the U.S. market has been tested for compliance with the extremely low EPA TSCA Title VI emission limits.
